CHINNOR WAR HORSE RETURNS FOR REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE



We had a very special Remembrance Service at school on Friday 11th November. First of all we had a visit from Abbie the 20-year-old Chinnor War Horse. Owner Maurice Britnell (pictured below on Abbie) came dressed as a First World War soldier from the Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars, and he was accompanied by his wife Lucinda. Maurice and Lucinda were on hand to answer all the children's questions about the role horses played in the war. The whole school, pictured above, gathered in the playground for our assembly, which was organised by Mrs Wakefield and Miss Baker. Charlie, Camille and Heidi read three poems, while Isaac said a prayer to remember those who had died.

At 11 o'clock the children, staff and parents held a two minutes' silence and then Sarah Hodge, whose late husband Frank was a governor at Lewknor Primary, played The Last Post on her E flat horn followed by Reveille.

The children sang three songs beautifully: Make Me A Channel For Your Peace, Amazing Grace and Bind Us Together. After that Peter gave a blessing to end the service.

The children then lined up in their classes to meet Abbie and to talk to Maurice and Lucinda. It turned out to be a very memorable morning.



Maurice told the children that initially 470,000 horses from Britain and Ireland were sent to France, but a further 600,000 horses from countries such as the USA and Canada and even Brazil followed. Only 60,000 horses came home and these belonged to officers. The other horses that survived the war found good homes in France.

Maurice had three ancestors who served in the First World War. Albert Britnell, who came from the Lewknor area, served in the 2nd Battalion Berkshire and died at the age of 24 on the first day of the Battle of Loos on 25th September, 1915. Another ancestor, who was also called Albert Britnell, came from Postcombe. He was in the Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars and survived the war. Frederick Britnell, who got married in St Margaret's Church, Lewknor, was part of the Royal Flying Corps 203 Squadron.

Maurice himself has seen some war action but of a very different nature. He was an extra in the Sam Mendes film 1917, which was partly filmed on Salisbury Plain. Maurice spent a month filming in a trench and said that if you watch the film you can hear him blow a whistle as the soldiers launch themselves over the top.

Maurice also got a part as an extra in the upcoming Ridley Scott film Napoleon, which is due to be released next year. He said: "One morning during filming I was a soldier in the French Revolutionary Army and I died at the Battle of Waterloo. In the afternoon I was a British soldier!" For both films Maurice had to undergo fitness training and for Napoleon he even had to grow some mutton chops!

Maurice has also played a medieval witch hunter riding Abbie in a film called Gossip, and he appears dressed in SWAT gear in Shooter, an upcoming Netflix series (though this time without Abbie). We hope to see Abbie back at school next year - our Remembrance Day service just wouldn't be the same without her.


