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ZOOM SCIENCE LESSON IS A HUGE SUCCESS

We had a great response for the Apollo 11 moon landing lesson when 30 families tuned in on Zoom. It was organised by Miss Lawes and scientists from the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory in Harwell. The children learned lots about the 'One Giant Leap for Mankind' moon landing and I was very impressed with the children's questions during the Q&A session. James asked about radio waves and contacting the spaceship, and we learned that radio waves travel through clouds but not rock, and so contact would have been broken as the ship orbited the moon. Alex asked if the scientists thought Michael Collins would have been disappointed because he was the only one of the three astronauts who did not get to walk on the moon. The scientists said they doubted very much he would have been disappointed because he had such a cool job making sure the rocket was on time to pick up the other two astronauts to take everyone back safely to Earth. We also learned that although the astronauts' footprints would now be white due to radiation. And another thing the children learned was that it wasn't just footprints, a flag, and space equipment that was left behind, the astronauts also left bags containing their poo!

Many thanks to all of you who took part, and to Miss Lawes for organising it all. There are now some follow-up activities that teachers have posted on their class pages. I hope you enjoy these activities.
