LOWER JUNIORS HAVE THE STOMACH FOR GUT SCIENCE!



Children in Mrs Wakefield's class have been learning all about the digestive system, and what actually happens to food when it gets to the stomach.

The children had a lot of fun mashing and squelching food and were shown how acid breaks down food.

Mrs Wakefield explained how the stomach produces strong acid. This kills many harmful microorganisms that might have been swallowed along with the food.

It also contains special chemicals called enzymes. These are important for breaking down the food so it can be absorbed by the body.

After it leaves the stomach, the partially-digested food passes into the intestines where it begins to be absorbed.
