UPPER JUNIORS LEARN ABOUT DARK MATTER DURING COOL SCIENCE TRIP

The children in Upper Juniors had their second school trip recently. This time they visited the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory at Harwell as part of the science curriculum. Elektra, in Year 6, (pictured right) wrote a smashing piece about the visit. Here is her account.

On Wednesday, Upper Juniors class visited the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory (RAL). We went so that we could learn about Dark Matter Day.

The first thing that we did was to gather round a lady named Lauren who taught us how to program the Beebots, which were little robots that looked like a bee. We were each given one and we had to program them to move around a maze. It was great fun!

After that, we moved onto another lady called Sophie who told us about dark matter. Apparently 20 million pass through us every second! We then had a go at making our own dark matter particles. Mine was called Sparkle Wings because she shot sparkles out of her wings to move.

After lunch, we were taken into a planetarium by a lady called Vicky. It was a big, dark dome that showed the night sky inside it and Vicky told us all the different types of stars and galaxies. It was fascinating and my favourite stars were: Sirius the dog, Scorpio, Leo, Cassiopeia and Taurus.

Next we switched over to a different lady named Rebecca. She told is a little more about the stars then we were asked to design our own stars! After we did that, we wrote a story about the star. I enjoyed this thoroughly.

Finally, we went into the speech theatre and skyped two men called Chris and Shian who were in a mine! We asked them lots of questions about the mine: they told us some stories of what had happened in the mine throughout the years.

MORE SCIENCE EXPERIMENTS IN THE CLASSROOM

Upper Juniors have been looking at the surface of the moon and its craters. These pictures (left and right) show the children investigating how craters are formed. They dropped marbles into trays containing flour and cocoa powder. They changed the height of the drop and the size of the marbles. They then observed and recorded the different shaped holes left in the powder.









CHILDREN'S GARDENING SKILLS KEEP GROWING!

Upper Juniors teamed up with children in the Reception class to plant bulbs in the school garden.

The bulbs came from Bulbs4kids - an educational programme promoted by a Dutch organisation. Their aim is to get children involved in nature, specifically in what they can do in their gardens.

When Miss Lawes applied for a pack of bulbs she thought she would receive a couple of dozen - nice for a small display. However, we received 650!

So the children have now planted around 400 tulips and daffodils, but we still have 50 daffodils, 100 crocus and 90 grape hyacinths to plant soon!

FREE SCHOOL MEAL ENTITLEMENT

From April 2015, the threshold figure which forms part of the tax credit free school meal eligibility category is £16,190.

Pupils whose parents/carers receive the following support payments are entitled to free school meals (assuming the parent does not receive Working Tax Credit). Under the current criteria, children who receive, or whose parents receive, one or more of the following support payments are entitled to receive free school meals and eligible for two-year-old funding:-

- Income-based and contribution-based Jobseekers Allowance or ESA on an equal basis
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, that does not exceed £16,190
- Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment someone receives for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Working Tax Credit, provided they have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190 per year (eligible for two-year-old funding only)
- Universal Credit

If you believe your child may be eligible to receive free school meals, please complete an application form and return it to the school office **as soon as possible**. Application forms can be downloaded from the school website or found in paper form in the letter rack at school. There is a very simple, confidential, process we can run through Oxfordshire County Council to check eligibility.




