The children also have opportunities to act out the story in groups and then write their own version of the story. The children in the Lower Juniors class have been reading a lovely book called the Tin Forest written by Helen Ward and beautifully illustrated by Wayne Anderson.

These photographs show the children taking part in a hot seating activity. Hot seating is a strategy in which a character from a story is played by a pupil. The other pupils in the group interview the 'character' from the story. This encourages the children to think deeply about the text, for example why does a character react the way they do, how might they be feeling?


